### Hearing Set For Chester Relief Sewer

A hearing of necessity will be held before Birmingham city commissioners Oct. 12 on the construction of a relief sewer in the Chester-Wallace area.

The hearing was prompted by a letter from Henry Fenske, 387 W. Brown.

Fenske told the commission the basements of his four-family terrace at Brown and Chester were continually flooding.

"Since the early spring of 1961 we have been plagued with trouble, flooding of all four basements when it rains," he said.

EFFORTS BY him to have the sewer constructed a few years ago failed, he said.

City Manager L. R. Gare said the present sewer serving the property was inadequate and the only solution would be a new sewer.

He noted, however, that previous attempts to approve the relief sewer had been rejected by the commission.

### Hills' Delays Zoning Change on 17 Acres

A request to rezone 17½ acres of land from A-1 (two acres) to A-2 (one and one-half acres) was tabled by the Bloomfield Hills City Commission Tuesday night until two abutting property owners are consulted.

Horace P. Shaw, 1253 N. Woodward, who owns the land, appeared before commissioners and asked that the land be rezoned. The property is located just north of Cranbrook Road and runs west from Woodward.

It was felt by several of the commissioners that if there is rezoning from two acres to one and one-half acres, it should also include abutting property owned by Dean Draper to the north and Roger M. Kyes to the south.

NEITHER HAS expressed a desire to have his land rezoned.

Shaw was asked by the commission to get together with Draper and Kyes and get their reactions to

the proposed rezoning before the next regular meeting.

In other action, commissioners indicated that they expect, within a week, a report from engineers on the ultimate cost of sewer construction in the city.

When the report is finished, a special meeting will be scheduled to determine what percentage of payback developers will receive should they decide to pay for their own sewers.

Preliminary study indicates that the \$170,000 now held by the city for future sewer construction will not be enough to pay the full cost.

The commission also:

• Authorized City Clerk Robert Stadler to draw up specifications and advertise for bids on two new police cars.

• Heard a report from Stadler that motorists on Woodward Ave. are not stopping for school buses loading and loading children.

Stadler said drivers in all four lanes are required to stop but are not doing so.

### Add County Twp., Hills To Law Suit

The City of Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield Township and Oakland County will be named as defendants in a property owners' suit aimed at stopping the construction of a high school on Lahser near Hickory Grove.

Circuit Judge Frederick C. Ziem last week gave attorney Louis J. Colombo, Jr., representing the plaintiffs, 30 days to file an amended complaint.

A pre-trial hearing on the suit was adjourned until the three governmental bodies have been added.

Colombo and several other property owners who live near the proposed site of the Hills school district's second high school brought suit against the school board on Aug. 7.

THE PROPERTY owners contend that Lahser Road, 20 feet wide between Long Lake and Hickory Grove, is not adequate to carry additional traffic to a high school and seek to determine who is responsible for maintaining and improving the road.

They hope to obtain a permanent injunction blocking the use of the site on Lahser near the southwest corner of Hickory Grove, for a high school.

L. W. McEntee, attorney for the Board of County Commissioners, believes the portion of Lahser in question "is a city street under the jurisdiction and control of the City of Bloomfield Hills although the westerly portion is physically located in Bloomfield Township."

Lawrence King, attorney for the school board, said he was "shopping for a final determination by mid-November before jury trials start."

the direction of Dr. George C. Hallock.

Dr. Hallock, who comes to Birmingham after 13 years in the Highland Park schools, will head the department that handles health, speech and special education.

"This department is vital to the improvement of our youngsters," Smith said. "With one office coordinating the entire set up, the program will be distinctly improved."

THE TEAM-TEACHING concept of which Dr. Smith is a pioneer is also being expanded during the 1964-65 school year.

Team-teaching is generally the use of two or more teachers in a classroom situation.

"We have scheduled a number of workshops for elementary school personnel dealing with the concepts of team-teaching."

"With the additions to Meadow Lake, Valley Woods and the new Evergreen site, we hope to have a chance to put in a more active team-teaching program," he said.

### B'ham Hires First Negro Teacher

The Birmingham Public School System has hired its first Negro teacher.

She is Mrs. Virginia O. Allen, a graduate of Indiana State College, Terre Haute, Ind. Mrs. Allen has been assigned to teach the third grade at Westchester Elementary School.

Mrs. Allen comes to Birmingham from the Grand Rapids Public Schools where she taught for six years.

Supt. John B. Smith said Mrs. Allen was hired solely for her teaching ability.

"We are seeking the best teachers we can find for the Birmingham school system," Smith said. "She has been hired on that basis."

"We have no restrictions about employment as far as I'm concerned," he added.


