"The first flats will be finished in time to be used on decorations for the opening tea, Sept. 20," Hodges states.

This work involves ripping the old covers of the huge wooden frames, stretching new muslin over them, sewing the fabric to fit and giving it a coat of sizing, preparatory to painting.

The group is building a stage-wide, 20-foot cyclorama or sky cloth which, in combination with ceiling flats also being built, will eliminate the use of "teasers" in many sets. Teasers, Hodges explains, are those drapes that come down from the stage ceiling, often destroying the realism.

This bidding was the usual, and most all West players did as the bidding asked for and led the Jack of Clubs. East was the winner with the ace and at most tables switched to the Queen of Spades. This is where the usual plan of the hand changed. Those who won the first spade trick and pulled trump and led the ace, then jack of diamonds, found themselves down one trick.

AT ONE QUICK glance at this hand, Judy knew she had this one trick in the club suit and one definite trick in the spade suit that must be lost. She allowed the first spade trick to hold, and when East continued with the suit, Judy went up with the ace, then drew three rounds of trump and then played the diamonds starting with the ace, then the hook of the jack.

East being unable to continue the spade suit did return the club, and Judy was able to discard the third spade in the closed hand on the fourth diamond. Many a top bridge player actually did fall to make this contract.

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
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


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
