Carling Open Puts Palmer Past Nicklaus

Arnold Palmer, by virtue of his second-place finish in the recent Carling World Open at Oakland Hills Country Club, has passed Jack Nicklaus in the PGA tour money winnings.

Palmer, who picked up \$17,000 in the first World Open, has now grossed \$110,743.37 in official earnings, while Nicklaus, who ended up far down in the field at Oakland Hills, has picked up \$101,917.85.

CARLING WORLD Open winner Bobby Nichols moved from 10th to 4th place in the official standings with \$72,087.26, just behind Tony Lema, who has received \$72,555.37 in official purses. Nichols earned \$35,000 for his Oakland Hills swing.

In fifth place is Billy Casper, followed in order by Gary Player, Ken Venturi, Juan "Chi Chi" Rodriguez, Mason Rudolph and Mike Souchak.

Arnold Palmer leads also in the Vardon Trophy standings and the Ryder Cup point standings. In 88 rounds, he has taken an average of 69.920 strokes. Bill Casper, Ken Venturi, Juan Rodriguez and Gene Littler follow in succession.

Palmer has a big lead over Billy Casper in Ryder Cup standings. Tony Lema is third, with Ken Venturi fourth and Tommy Jacobs fifth.

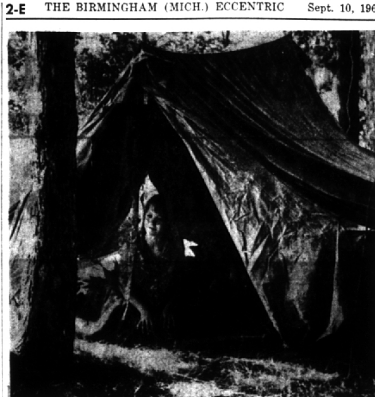

Every football season sees a lot of upsets. . . But, do you know what was the biggest upset of all-time? . . . Several years ago, sports-writers voted in a poll, and the game they selected was the one in 1921 when little Centre beat then mighty Harvard 6-0. That's the one they call the greatest upset of all-time.

Did you know that the idea for using rear-view mirrors on cars came about because of automobile racing? . . . In the early days of auto racing, there were two people in each car—the driver and a mechanic. . . The mechanic served as a sort of "co-pilot," telling the driver if anything was coming up behind him. . .
