Exempt Tax Groups To Update Records

R. I. Nixon, Detroit District Director of the Internal Revenue Service announced that the service is asking some 500,000 organizations exempt from Federal income tax to cooperate in updating its records prior to conversion to automatic data processing.

Those affected are religious, charitable, educational, civic, labor and other organizations exempt under Sections 501(a) or 521 of the Internal Revenue Code.

They are being requested to complete and submit brief questionnaires providing current data as to name, address, employer identification number, purposes of the organization and nature of the organization's activities. The forms will be mailed to the organizations during the next several months.

NIXON STATED that Internal Revenue's records, after verification from the questionnaires, will be converted to magnetic tape. This conversion is the first step in establishing an Exempt Organization Master File, which, complementing the already operating Master File systems for business and individual taxpayers, will be processed on Internal Revenue's Automatic Data Processing equipment.

Under the Master File System

there will be one central magnetic tape record to which all transactions affecting an exempt organization, such as returns, audit results from current and past years, address changes, and so forth, will be posted.

The Master File tape will be the source for lists such as the "Cumulative List of Organizations Contributions to Which are Deductible." (Publication 78).

It will greatly facilitate the processing of exempt organization returns, and will generally aid Internal Revenue in evaluating and administering compliance with the exempt sections of the Internal Revenue Code.

Nixon said organizations should return questionnaires promptly, using the return envelopes provided.

AN EXEMPT organization should await receipt of a questionnaire by mail, rather than requesting one from Internal Revenue, since the mailings will take several months.

Completion of the mailing program will be announced, after which organizations believing themselves to be exempt, but which have not received questionnaires, should contact their Internal Revenue District Director for instructions.

School Year Combines Good With the Bad

Labor Day marked the end of summer vacation for most of Michigan's 1,800,000 school-age children. Traditionally, mothers heaved a sigh of relief and teachers merely sighed as the kids tumbled back to the school-day routine.

Close to 77,700 teachers, some experienced and some fresh out of college, will be ready for the youngsters in such fields as special education, science and English.

Most of the state's 1,414 school districts will be feeling the pinch of higher enrollments and higher costs this school year. Some, those who have passed special millages, will be able to cope successfully with the increase. Other schools, however, will be resorting to double and triple shifts, half-day schedules and curtailed school services. Athletics and extra-curricular activities have been cut from many school schedules while other systems have been forced to cut into their academic programs.

ALTHOUGH SOME 140 new school buildings will be opening, makeshift portable classroom units will still be needed. Trailer-like structures have sprouted on playgrounds over the summer and will be pressed into use as classrooms this fall.

On the positive side, however, new techniques have been developed to effectively teach larger classes. Language laboratories with tape-recording and teacher-listening devices have become standard equipment in most new schools, as have multi-purpose lecture-demonstration rooms.

In addition, today's students are learning more in less time. Advanced classes in all high school academic areas are being offered in some of the state's schools; creativity is being stressed in many elementary schools.

Summer school has also proved a boon for many students. In addition to the traditional remedial work, advanced classes and non-academic extras are being offered to an ever-increasing number of students.

Shepherd King Pastor Celebrates 20th Year

On Sunday, Sept. 13, the Reverend and Karl Boehmke, pastor of Lutheran Church of the Shepherd King, Middlebelt and Maple Roads, will be feted on the 20th anniversary of his ordination into the Lutheran ministry.

A guest speaker will give the sermon at the morning worship services and a social hour will be held in the fellowship hall of the church at 5 p.m. for friends and members of the church.

Pastor Boehmke and his wife, the former Miss LaVerne Telle of St. Louis, reside in West Bloomfield Township with their children, Sharon, 18, who will be attending Valparaiso University this fall, Karl, 15, and Anne, 12.

IN ADDITION to his duties as pastor of the church, he serves as chaplain at the Air Force Reserve at Selfridge Air Base, holding the rank of Major. He has served in various capacities in community and world-wide projects.

Pastor Boehmke, a native of Buffalo, N. Y., attended East High School there and Concordia College Institute in Bronxville, N. Y., before going on to Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He was graduated in 1944 from Concordia, and established Pilgrim congregation in Washington, D. C., while Missionary-at-large for the Southeast District.

During the Korean conflict he was stationed at Westover Air Force Base in Massachusetts and saw brief overseas duty as temporary chaplain to the Azores.

Federal Posts Slate Exam Schedules

Applications are now being accepted for the 1965 Federal Service Entrance Examination, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced.

This examination, open to college seniors and graduates regardless of major study, as well as to persons who have had equivalent experience, offers the opportunity to begin a career in the Federal service in one of over 200 kinds of positions.

These positions are located in various Federal agencies both in Washington, D. C. and throughout the United States. A few overseas positions will also be filled.

DEPENDENT on the qualifications of the candidates, starting salaries for persons appointed from this examination will be \$5,000 and \$6,050 a year. A written test is required, except for those candidates who have attained a sufficiently high score on the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test.

Applicants who file by Sept. 17, will be scheduled for the first written test on Oct. 17. Six additional tests have been scheduled. The closing date is April 15, 1965.

A limited number of Management Internships with starting salaries of \$6,050 and \$7,220 a year will also be filled from this examination. An additional written test is required and additional education or experience is required for the positions paying \$7,220 a year. Applicants for these positions must file by Jan. 21, 1965.

Details concerning the requirements, further information about the positions to be filled, and instructions on how to apply are given in Civil Service Announcement No. 333. The announcement may be obtained from many post office locations throughout the country, college placement offices, Civil Service Regional Offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.
