Look Out For Dogs In B'field!

Dogs are like the weather. Everybody complains about them but nobody does anything about them.

That must be how Homer Case of Bloomfield Township felt Monday night when he commented on a rise in the number of dog complaints on the police report.

COMPLAINTS totaled 65 for August, 1964, as compared to only 17 for the same month last year. For January through June the total was 278—and only 161 for the first six months of last year. "Quite a few people are being bitten by dogs," Case said. "I'm sure that there are more than are listed in the police reports. Many persons just don't want to do anything about dogs."

"They must like dogs better than shrubs or kids," he added.

CASE SAID there are more unlicensed dogs in the township than licensed—maybe too many to be properly policed by the Oakland County dog warden.

"How many dogs would you say the township has—one for every house?" the supervisor asked. Trustee Robert Sinclair said he thought that estimate was a little high but agreed that the canine population is on the increase.

County Health Service Approves First Budget

The newly-initiated Community Mental Health Services Program gained financial Friday with approval of a \$250,000 budget by the Ways and Means Committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. Oakland is the first county in the state to form such a board.

William H. Wagner, of Berkley, financial chairman of the Oakland County Community Mental Health Services Board, announced the step forward at a board meeting Friday. The proposed budget is subject to final approval by the Board of Supervisors.

WAGNER SAID the financial committee will meet as soon as possible with state officials to request matching state funds. By state law the Community Mental Health Services Program is to be subsidized with equal amounts of county and state money.

A second step was taken Friday when Dr. Norman Rosenzweig, of Bloomfield Hills, the temporary consulting psychiatric director, appeared for the first time before the 12-man board.

Dr. Rosenzweig stressed two aspects of the Mental Health Services Program: making best use of available community facilities and accommodating numbers of patients.

"ONE OUT OF 10 persons needs psychiatric care sometime in his life," Dr. Rosenzweig said, "and two or three out of 10 persons could use it at various times in their lives."

"We need to develop an overall plan whereby the various needs of mental patients are met, and most importantly, we need to identify the patients' needs," he added.

"Existing services should be incorporated into the program to be most effective, rather than expanded piecemeal," the doctor said.

DR. ROSENZWEIG pointed out that four hospitals within Oakland County either have or are developing psychiatric departments and need to be fitted into the program. He said that by design the efforts of the Community Mental Health Program out-patient, inpatient and day care centers reinforce each other rather than compete in treatment as would three separate institutions.

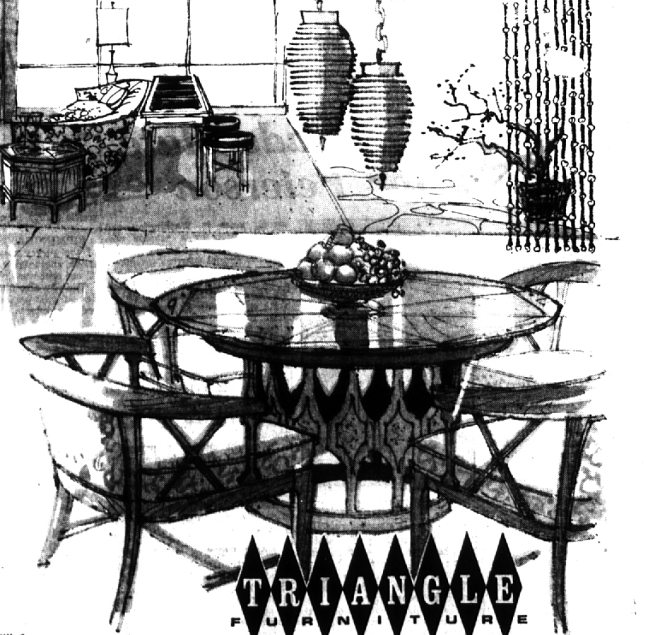
