Farmers Must Replace Lime, Survey Shows

Michigan farmers are taking a more realistic look at the lime needs of their soil.

This is indicated by a Michigan State University soil science survey now being compiled from tonnage figures obtained from 155 individual lime distributors supplying the state's farmers with agricultural lime.

The dominant influence in the soil liming program for the past 25 years has been the agricultural conservation program of the United States Department of Agriculture through which the cost of lime applied to fields is shared with the farmer on a 50-50 basis.

JAMES PORTER, MSU extension soil scientist, points out that limited USDA sharing funds have held the annual use of lime in Michigan at about 400,000 tons during the past decade. Yet the state's needs are roughly 1,200,000 tons annually as indicated by soil type and soil test surveys, indicates Porter.

The soil scientist bases this idea on the fact that the total tonnage of lime reported by distributors has been nearly equal that applied to fields under the USDA cost-share program.

FERTILIZER USE, in the meantime, has climbed from 611,000 tons in 1963 to 773,000 tons in 1963.

Porter says 1963 brought some long-needed changes. A total of 396,600 tons of lime were applied under the cost-share program during 1963. However, distributors applied 408,900 tons of lime during the same year.

"This is an indication that more farmers are using soil needs as a guide to lime use rather than the amount for which shared cost funds are available," says Porter.

MANY FARMERS are recognizing high yields can deplete lime rapidly and that ever increasing tonnages of nitrogen and mixed fertilizers also take a heavy toll.

Porter pointed out that each pound of nitrogen applied in fertilizer removes an average of about three pounds of limestone equivalent from the soil. This occurs in addition to the increased lime removed through higher yielding crops.

The returns per dollar invested in liming material on soils needing lime are usually as high or even higher than for fertilizer, adds the soil scientist. The result is that yields decline. Farmers frequently blame yield decline on weather, insects or poor seed when the real reason is inadequate lime.
