burgundy velvet and carried mauve pink frosted grapes and ivy.

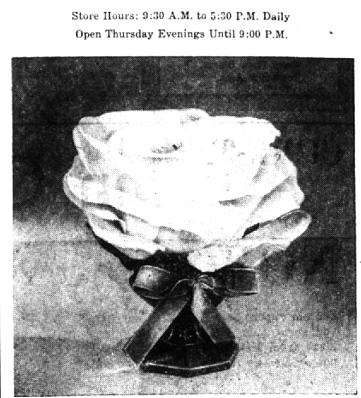

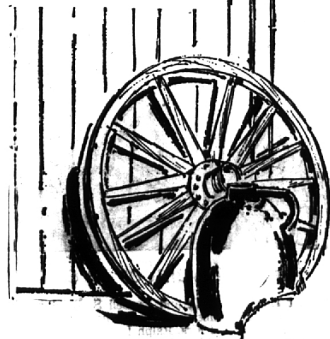
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
