

## Major Exhibit Scheduled by Area Sculptor

The first major art exhibition of the fall season opens in Detroit on Monday, at the Franklin Siden Gallery, 213 David Whitney Bldg. Sculpture by the artist Julius Schmidt, 51 Academy Way, Bloomfield Hills, will be shown at his premier midwest one-man exhibit.

Schmidt, whose work in iron and bronze has received world-wide attention and recognition, has lived and worked in the Detroit area for many years. He graduated from Cranbrook Academy of Art in 1952 with a bachelor of fine arts degree.

Since 1962 he has been chairman of the sculpture department at that school. During the intervening years Schmidt held a similar post at Kansas City Art Institute and taught at Cleveland Institute of Art and Rhode Island School of Design, among others. He was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship in 1963.

SCHMIDT'S SCULPTURE has appeared in the foremost exhibitions here and abroad, including the Carnegie International and VII Biennial in Sao Paulo, Brazil. His work is represented in the permanent collections of the Art Institute of Chicago, Museum of Modern Art, New York City, Walker Art Center, Minneapolis, Whitney Museum of American Art and many other museums.

Some of the private collection of contemporary art include the sculpture of Julius Schmidt.

## Courses Cover Many Topics

Once again members of the Village Woman's Club are checking their calendars, schedules and interests in preparation for their fall lineup of classes, a program of educational opportunities which they are inviting all women of the community to share.

Mrs. Karlton Pierce and her program committee have secured instructors for a wide variety of courses.

The latest ideas for homes will be presented in a six-week course entitled New Concepts in Home Design and Decoration. Various authorities in interior design and decoration will report and discuss the newest developments in furnishing and enhancing homes.

Parliamentary Practice and Progress, taught by Mrs. John H. Ganstow, will include actual class participation in parliamentary procedures. This will be a practical course for those involved in church, club and civic activities with their resultant meetings.

CHARLES R. CLARKE, who teaches advanced radio and television writing at Wayne State

University, will instruct a new course—The Craft of Writing, as a result of which he says he expects at least one out of three of his pupils to publish their work commercially. Clarke has sold stories and scripts to television, has had four stage plays produced and is about to publish a novel.

Five classes in French are scheduled, each designed to suit varying capabilities. Mrs. Patrick Courcier and M. Jean Pierre Autochard will instruct, these courses.

Spanish I, II, and III, taught by Mrs. Day Krolik and Mrs. Luiza Bueno, are also offered.

Mrs. Lawson McKenzie, a certified teacher of Ikebana, will teach Japanese flower arrangement. Ikebana, the use of line rather than form in flower arranging, is used to suggest the natural growth of the material or to suggest the appearance of a view or a garden scene.

Afternoon and evening mixed classes of bridge (modern point count holdings) will be taught by Mrs. Bernard Lourim.

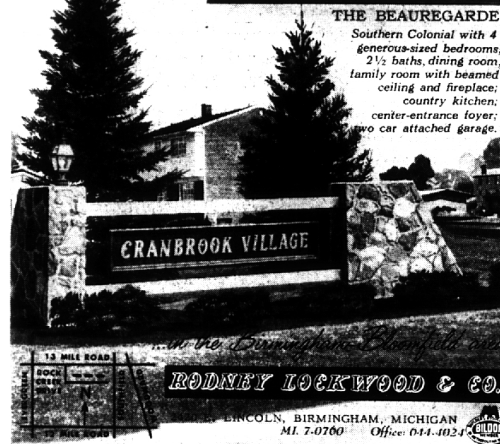

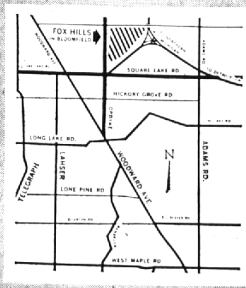
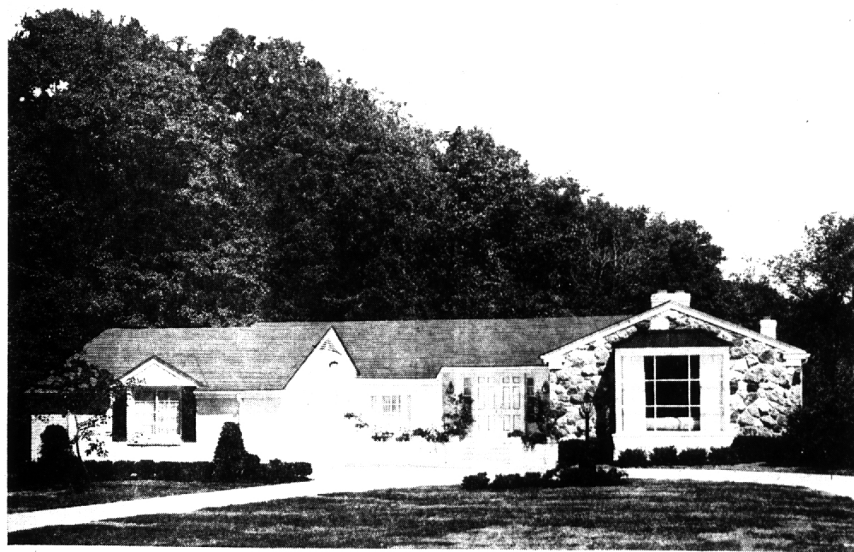
