## Half Price Listed For License Plates

Michigan motorists can now purchase 1964 license plates at half price, Sec. of State James M. Hare announced recently.

However, the new half-price schedule does not include watercraft plates or half-year commercial and half-year trailer plates, Hare cautioned.

IN MAKING the announcement, the Secretary of State disclosed that 1965 plates, and they'll be plates, not tabs, will go on sale to the general public Nov. 1. Hare said he expected a "rush" at branch offices all over Michigan when the plates go on sale.

Also effective on Nov. 1, Hare said his office will discontinue issuing replacement passenger plates for \$1.00 when the originals are rusted or faded. Instead, if a motorist wishes replacement plates for 1964, he will have to pay a fee of \$2.00.

## Coast Guard Cutter Studies Earth's Crust

For the second year in succession and the third time since 1958, the Duluth, Minn., based Coast Guard Cutter Woodrush assisted in explosion-seismology experiments to determine the thickness and topography of the earth's crust to points some 20 miles in depth.

The program was coordinated by Dr. R. P. Meyer of the Geophysical and Polar Research Center of the University of Wisconsin.

IN ADDITION to the civilian scientists and conservation officers on board, a Navy Explosive Ordnance team supervised the shooting or setting-off of explosive charges weighing up to 2000 pounds each.

Some 30 to 40 shots of this size were made for the benefit of about 18 land listening and recording stations manned by various university and research crews which observed the strength of seismic shock waves and the time required for them to travel through underlying materials of the earth's crust.

THROUGH SCIENTIFIC laws of reflection and refraction the scientists were able to calculate the depth, thickness and topography of the crust.

Most of the major or large charges were set off during the night when there was the least interference at land recording stations from human activity ashore.

The large charges were also set off in depths of water over 300 feet to avoid any significant fish kill, plus the fact that the great depth provided relatively constant conditions for explosive work, and the drilling of shot holes was not necessary.

A SECOND phase of the program called for the evaluation of hydrophone buoys for possible use in ocean surveys where the use of shore-based listening and recording stations is not practical. The experienced buoy-handling crew of Woodrush played a vital role in rigging, setting, and retrieving these buoys.

The current experiment ran from 11 to 31 July. The Woodrush covered the entire 365 mile length of Lake Superior from Michipicoten Harbor, Can., to Knife River, Minn.

## Felony Charge Dismissed in Sign Squabble

Charges of destroying political signs against a Berkeley constable and a Bloomfield Township justice were dismissed in township justice court last week.

Justice Alice Gilbert, however, ordered constable Roy M. West and Joe Rayman, Jr., to stand trial in her court at 10 a.m., Oct. 6, on charges of malicious destruction of property—a misdemeanor.

DESTROYING political signs is a felony.

West and Rayman, who was nominated by township Republicans in the Sept. 1 primary for Bloomfield Township constable were originally charged with felony counts of malicious destruction and conspiracy to commit such destruction.

Mrs. Gilbert said Prosecutor Richard P. Condit "failed to show that more than \$100 damage was done," requirement for a felony charge.

"There was no evidence of conspiracy," she added.

WEST AND Rayman were charged in a warrant sought by William E. Lang, senior assistant prosecutor, later defeated in the Republican primary for prosecutor.

Lang claims the two destroyed his two billboards at Big Beaver Road and Woodward Ave., Bloomfield Township.
