Forget Your Diet—Serve a Torte Treat!

Forget the calories, just this once, and treat your family to Chocolate Meringue Torte. This rich dessert is just too good to be missed.

The "crust" is a frothy baked meringue. The creamy smooth filling is a double chocolate... chocolate milk and chocolate bits. Pipe with whipped cream.

CHOCOLATE MERINGUE TORTE

3 egg whites
Dash of salt
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup whipping cream, whipped and sweetened

Preheat oven to 450°. Beat egg whites until frothy. Add salt and cream of tartar; beat until egg whites stand in soft peaks. Add sugar, a tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat 15 minutes after all sugar is added. Add vanilla. Spread meringue in buttered 9-inch oven pie pan. Put

in oven; turn off heat immediately. Leave in 4-5 hours or overnight. DO NOT PEEK! Spoon whipped cream into meringue shell. Spoon in creamy chocolate filling. Cover with foil; let stand in refrigerator 8 hours.

CREAMY CHOCOLATE FILLING

2 cups chocolate milk (or drink)
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 egg yolks, well beaten
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine chocolate milk, flour, sugar and salt. Bring to boil over low heat, stirring constantly. Stir half of hot mixture into egg yolks. Add to remaining hot mixture. Bring to a boil; cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add chocolate pieces and vanilla. Chill.

B'ham Alumnae Mark Barnard's 75th Year

Sculptor Schmidt Leads Ideal Life: Teacher, Artist

What could be an ideal life for an artist? Julius Schmidt, sculptor and head of the sculpture department at Cranbrook Academy of Art, feels he has the answer.

He does not need to teach to earn a living for his wife and new daughter. His cast metal sculpture is successful both in world-wide competitions and in his New York Gallery.

Conversely, he needn't sculpt for money since he enjoys the atmosphere of a community of artists at Cranbrook where he constructed the foundry in the only new building added to the academy of art in many years.

SCHMIDT, A continuous and productive artist, has been casting bronzes (in various alloys and metals) all summer for his current exhibition at the Franklin Siden Gallery in Detroit which runs until October 16.

The show includes twenty sculptures and several drawings and reveals an expert craftsman a superbly proficient in casting and handling his medium.

All of the works have a basically simple shape: a tall column, a flat panel, a helmet or an anvil. None are representative in the standard sense, only reminiscent or interpreted by the viewer.

THE SIMPLICITY of the overall form tends to focus attention on the surface treatment. Here, a myriad of protruding and indented tiny shapes, mechanical in type, texture the entire surface.

The sculptures are encrusted with exquisite patinas: blue, green, metallic and black. Acids and chemicals reacting with the metal build up an aged protective surface.

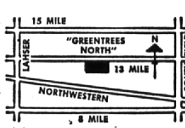

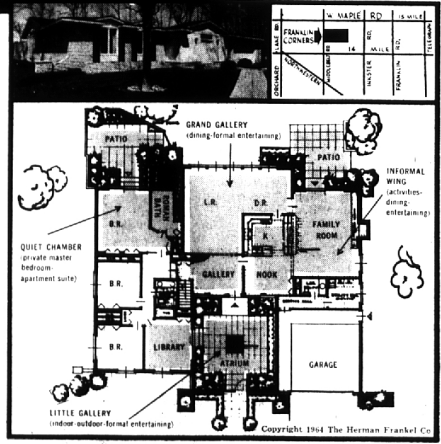
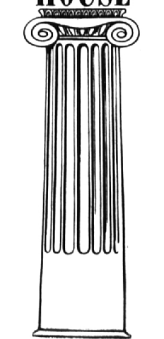
