## Movie Producer Returns to Hills From Film Location

Detroit film producer Stephen F. Booth returned to his Bloomfield Hills studio today after an eight-day trip to Utah and Arizona to finish scouting locations in the Grand Canyon area for the production of "Brighty," Marguerite Henry's adventure story of a burro that lived in the canyon 50 years ago.

"Brighty" will be Booth's first full-length theatrical motion picture. Previously, as owner of Paragon Productions, he has produced documentary and educational films for businesses and other organizations. The motion picture and television rights to "Brighty" were acquired late in 1963.

Booth reported today that photography of wildlife and general winter scenes in the canyon will begin in about two months, and that full production with a cast of more than 150 actors and extras and scores of animals is scheduled to start about March 1, 1965.

## 29 Residents to Teach Adult Courses at OU

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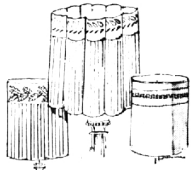
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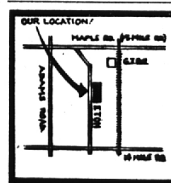
