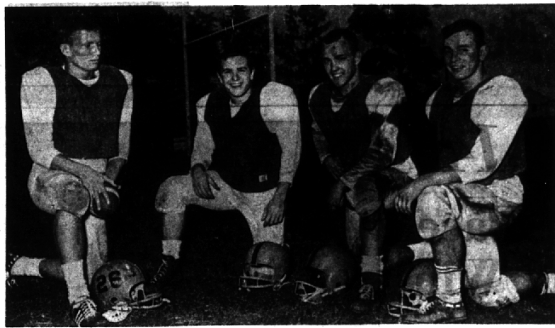

Brother Rice Eleven Aims for Higher Finish

Despite an opening game loss to Catholic Central Sunday, Brother Rice head coach Joe Pascuzzi thinks things will be better this year than the school's 0-8 mark of 1963.

Rice, who moved into the Catholic League's Central Division last season, could play a spoiler role this year.

"We've got our main players back this year and things should

be a little better, with 11 lettermen," Pascuzzi said. Senior Jim Chenet, a 180-pound quarterback, will take over from graduated Paul Jagels. An average passer, Chenet will receive some competition from junior Kevin O'Connor.

FLEET-FOOTED Don Corrigan and sophomore Paul Lutz will start at the halves with 6-foot, 230-pound Paul Deroche running at fullback.

Corrigan, who weighs just 145,

makes up for this with a 10-second 100 Lutz, at 160, has shown a great deal of promise. Deroche adds muscle to the backfield. He played tackle during his junior year.

Senior Jim Bodary, Bob Gabriel and Louis Fontana give experience and weight to the tackle slots, while four fine prospects have shaped up at guard. Mike Hudgens and junior Wayne Feratle will get the nod, but only a shade behind are Bill Cheslin and Greg Murphy. Senior Frank Haradi and Roger Tremblay will spell at center.

THE WARRIORS will seek their first victory of the 1964 season Friday night at Hammersburg. Friday night they take on Cathedral Central, 20-0 victors over U. of D.

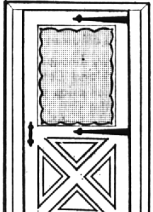
